### What is the TOPP Program and how is FARRMS involved?

- Through the [Transition to Organic Partnership Program \(TOPP\)](#) the USDA is investing up to \$100 million over five years in cooperative agreements with non-profit organizations to increase the number of farmers transitioning to certified organic production.
- FARRMS is part of the [Plains Transition to Organic Partnership Program \(Plains TOPP\)](#). Led by [OCIA International](#), Plains TOPP is a coalition of organizations providing technical assistance and wrap-around support for transitioning and existing organic farmers. Plains TOPP serves operators in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, North and, South Dakota, and Oklahoma.

### Where can I get help with the costs of organic certification?

- [ND Organic Certification Cost Share](#): The North Dakota Department of Agriculture administers the USDA Organic Cost Share Reimbursement Program. Organic producers (crops, wild crops, and/or livestock) and/or handlers are eligible for reimbursement of 75 percent of initial or renewal organic certification costs
- [ND Organic Transition/Education Cost Share](#) The Program reimburses crop and livestock farmers up to \$750 for certain costs associated with transitioning to USDA-certified organic production. Also, farmers are eligible for up to \$250 of reimbursement for approved educational expenses. If you are already a USDA-certified organic producer, you do not qualify for this program.
- [OCCSP](#): Provides cost-share assistance to producers and handlers of agricultural products who are obtaining or renewing their certification under the [National Organic Program](#) (NOP). Certified operations may receive up to 75 percent of their certification costs paid during the program year.
